

Sound Solution Checklist

If your space includes any of the following you may have a noise problem that can be solved by one of our proven systems. The solution may be Sound Absorption, Sound Blocking, or Sound Masking. Realizing the noise problem is the first step to your solution.

Materials:

- Floors (Wood, Wood Composite, Vinyl, Ceramic Tile, or Concrete)
- Walls (Wood, Wood Composite, Ceramic Tile, Masonry, or Drywall)
- Ceilings (Wood, Ceiling Tile, Drywall, or Exposed Structure)

Areas:

- Rooms within your home (Can hear people, audio equipment, or outdoor sounds during times of rest or study)
- Church Auditorium or Sanctuary (You cannot understand what the speaker is saying, the space is so loud during gatherings it is uncomfortable, you have to speak louder than normal to be heard, you have noticed people are avoiding gatherings due to noise)
- Church Fellowship Hall (You cannot understand what the speaker is saying, the space is so loud during gatherings it is uncomfortable, you have to speak louder than normal to be heard, you have noticed people are avoiding gatherings due to noise, or the music is distorted and the reverberation is extreme)
- Classrooms (You cannot understand what the speaker is saying or people around you are a noise distraction)
- Band Room (The music is distorted and the reverberation is extreme or as a teacher you are noticing a loss of hearing after hours a day of instrument exposure)

- ___ Meeting Rooms (You cannot understand what the speaker is saying or people around you are a noise distraction)

- ___ Conference Room (Discussions of private information can be heard outside the room)

- ___ Banquet Halls (You cannot understand what the speaker is saying, the space is so loud during gatherings it is uncomfortable, you have to speak louder than normal to be heard, the music is distorted and the reverberation is extreme)

- ___ Exam Rooms (You can hear the patient's information in the next room which is a violation of privacy laws)

- ___ Waiting Area (You can hear personal information being discussed which is a violation of privacy laws)
